The end of the RPBL Spring Recreation Season is approaching, but first we have *PLAYOFFS!* The playoff season kicked in last week with the start of the double elimination tournament of the Teen League. The American and National Leagues follow suit this Tuesday, June 1st. Playoff brackets will be post **here** until champions in each league are crowned.

All Star games are scheduled for **Friday June 11**. The National League games will start at **6PM** at Druid Hill Park fields 1 & 2. These will be followed at **8PM** by the American League. Team assembly will be handled by the league coordinators. Teens will meet at Swann Park for a **7PM** game time.

Commissioner On Deck

Roland Park Baseball Leagues is drawing to the end of its 70th season, and alongside it, the two-year commissioner's term is also coming to a close. While the transition officially occurs at the conclusion of the spring season, the next commissioner has already been vetted and selected by the Board of Trustees, and she has accepted.

Heather Harlan-Warnack will serve as 46th commissioner. She enters at a time the league will be resuming operation following two seasons of pandemic restrictions and safety concerns. The nominating committee recognizes in Heather career skills and experience that align well with the task of stabilizing league revenue and the demands of innovation that keeps RPBL ahead of other youth athletic options in the Baltimore area.

A long-time resident of north Baltimore City, Heather has worked extensively with schools and community service organizations in the area. Currently and for the past few years she has been employed as Director of Development at The Gilman School following work at Maryvale Preparatory School. In addition to the RPBL Board of Trustees, she has served as President of the Baltimore Board of Directors of the American Heart Association, Alumni Board of Roland Park Country School and boards of the Second Presbyterian Church. Each of these positions has made use of her communications and fundraising talents, and her desire to build relationships between these organizations and the communities in which they reside.

Heather comes to the league by way of her two sons, both of whom played RPBL since Tee Ball, and both of whom qualify for the Teen League next year. She also lives with her husband John, and dog Harper, neither of whom play baseball for RPBL - yet.

BALTIMORE BASEBALL BITS

Wee Willie Keeler

One of the pleasures of the Charm City is the fabulous Oriole Park at Camden Yards. The park contains some wonderful detail including a mural in the left field stairwell near the monument park which honors the champion NL Oriole teams of the 1890's, led by one of the greatest hitters of all-time, 5'4" 140 lb. Wee Willie Keeler, whose explanation of his batting prowess was summed up in 5



words: he "Hit 'em where they ain't."

Keeler maintains the longest consecutive game hitting streak in NL history at 45, which he established over the final game of the 1896 season and the first 44 in 1897. The record remains unmatched in 2021 after 124 NL seasons as does his record for lowest ratio of strikeouts to at bats.

Only Joe Dimaggio's 56 game hit streak in 1941 is higher than Keeler's in major league history. Dimaggio incredibly posted a 61 game streak for the San Francisco Seals in the Pacific Coast League in 1933, second best all-time for a minor leaguer. His longest MLB streak other than the 56 gamer totalled only 19 games. His brother Dom holds the Red Sox consecutive game hit streak at 34. Back to Keeler, who ended his career by following his legendary Baltimore manager Ned Hanlon to Brooklyn in 1899 then moving boroughs to Upper Manhattan where he was the first star of the AL Highlanders (later Yankees) from 1903 to 1909, and playing a final year for his old Baltimore Oriole teammate John McGraw for the NY Giants in 1910.

Keeler retired with a .341 deadball era batting average and was enshrined in Cooperstown in 1939. He died at age 50 of complications from tuberculosis and endocarditis.

Play by the Rules Quiz

#1 – Runners on first and third, one out. The pitcher disengages the rubber and errantly attempts to throw to first base to pick off the runner. His throw goes into the stands. Where do the runners end up?

#2 – With bases loaded the batter pops up to the pitcher. An infield fly is called, though the runner on third heads for home anyway. The pitcher drops the popup but quickly recovers tossing the ball to the catcher who steps on home before the runner. What is the outcome?

Answers to Issue #9 Play by the Rules Quiz

#1 — The base runner stays on second base. This, as of the 2020 baseball season, is a "foul tip". The rule concerning a foul tip used to state that the ball must first hit the catcher's glove or hand. That is no longer the case. As long as the ball goes sharply and directly back to the catcher and he catches the ball, it is a "foul tip".

A foul tip is treated identically to a clean strike. If the catcher drops the ball, it is a foul ball and the runner would have to return to first.

- #2 The batter is not out. It is not a double play. The runner goes back to first base. When the ball goes sharply and directly back to the catcher, it can ONLY be a foul tip or a foul ball. For a foul tip, the catcher must be the one to catch it. When the pitcher catches the ball, it simply becomes a foul ball. The base runner goes back to first base.
- #3 They are not batting out of order. In the first inning, they were, but batting out of order is only done on appeal. The line up is not set by how a team bats. It is set by the line up card. Once Jackson batted, the next batter is Abel. It does not matter where he previously batted.
