BALTIMORE BASEBALL BITS

Charles Albert "Chief" Bender

Editor's Note: This newsletter was originally scheduled for November in honor of Native American Heritage Month.



Remembering Hall of Fame pitcher Charles Albert "Chief" Bender, for November's Native American Heritage Month. Bender was a clutch performer for the Philadelphia Athletics from 1903 to 1914. In 1910, he posted a record of 23-5 with a 1.58 ERA and helped the A's beat the Cubs in the World Series.

In 1911, he went 17-5 with a 2.16 ERA, as the A's became the first AL team to win back-to-back World Series. Bender threw 3 complete games in the '11 Series, winning games 4 and the clinching Game 6. In '13, the A's won their third World Series in

4 years with Bender completing and winning Games 1 and 4. In 10 career World Series starts, Bender completed 9 games, won 6, and had an ERA of 2.44.

Bender coached in the minors (sometimes as player-coach) and major leagues after his successful big league playing career effectively ended with a stint with the Phillies in 1916 and 17. In 1922, he managed the International League's Reading (PA) Aces followed by a year with the IL Baltimore Orioles in '23. From 1924-1928, he managed the baseball team at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis. In 1925 he was also on the coaching staff for his former teammate Eddie Collins' White Sox and made a one inning appearance on the mound. During several off-seasons while playing in the big leagues in Philadelphia, he sold sporting goods at Wanamaker's department store and eventually owned his own store.

Bender was born in Crow Wing County, Minnesota in 1884, a member of the Ojibwe tribe, and spent much of his early life living in poverty on the White Earth Reservation in NW Minnesota. He persevered through racist and demeaning comments from opponents throughout his career and was often caricatured in the press or portrayed as a cartoon. Despite the bigotry he often encountered, Bender maintained a kind disposition and was remembered fondly by teammates and those he coached and played for. Longtime roommate and fellow pitcher Rube Bressler said of Bender: "He was one of the finest and kindest men who ever lived." Respected for his intelligence on the diamond, Bender was a Renaissance Man, skilled at diverse interests including trap shooting, gardening, oil painting, and billiards. He lived to see his election to Cooperstown but passed away from prostate cancer in 1954 before his scheduled induction ceremony. He is buried in Roslyn, a Philadelphia suburb.

Governor's Service Award Goes to Trevor Khouzami

In the spring of 2016 the trustees were presented an idea for a fundraising event different from others. That September, Trevor Khouzami's idea - the RPBL Fall Classic Wiffleball Tournament and Home Run Derby - was played for the first time raising thousands of dollars for school programs. PLAY BY THE RULES QUIZ

- #1 With a batter at the plate, the second baseman starts waving her hands wildly up and down in an effort to distract the batter. Was the second baseman violating a specific baseball rule?
- #2 With a runner on first base the batter hits a grounder that goes under the diving first baseman. The ball then strikes the runner. Which statement is correct?
 - 1. The runner is out because the runner is always out when hit by a batted ball.
 - 2. The runner is safe because the ball had already passed the first baseman.
 - 3. It depends on whether the umpire judged the second baseman could have made a play.

- 4. It depends on whether the umpire judged that the runner could have gotten out of the way of the ball.
- #3 Can a run score when there is a triple play

Answers to Issue #7 Play by the Rules Quiz

- #1 Correct answer is "c," obstruction. The only other baseball term offered as an answer was "interference."
- #2 The correct answer is "true," at least according to how professional umpires are likely to officiate the play. The problem lies with the fact that the *Official Rules* fail to define the "act of fielding" a batted or thrown ball.
- #3 The correct answer is "c," ground rule double. The position of the ball when it is touched is the important thing in regard to whether the ball is fair or foul, not the position of the player.
- #4 The correct answer is "c," R1 scores and the batter-runner is awarded second. Advanced umpires are the ones who can correctly award bases on overthrows, and readily distinguish between interference and obstruction.
