#### **BALTIMORE BASEBALL BITS**

### **Foxy Ned**



More baseball Hall of Famers - four- are buried in Baltimore's New Cathedral Catholic Cemetery than any other. All 4 managed in the big leagues and three of the four played for the fourth - "Foxy" Ned Hanlon. Hanlon played in the big leagues in Cleveland, Detroit, Pittsburgh, and Baltimore and was known for his aggressive base running and range in centerfield. He managed the National League's Baltimore Orioles from 1892-1898, winning pennants in 3 consecutive years from 1894-'96. Over 5 seasons from '94-'98, he amassed an impressive win-loss record of 446-201. It can be argued persuasively that the greatest

baseball team of the nineteenth century had Baltimore as its home. Hanlon went on to

manage the Brooklyn Superbas (later Dodgers) and won NL pennants there in 1899 and 1900.

Hanlon was an innovator - employing what is today called small ball- employing bunts and base stealing to manufacture runs. He is credited as being the first to utilize the hit and run play. He was masterful with personnel matters as well, developing and improving the games of John McGraw and Wilbert Robinson and executing trades for Wee Willie Keeler, Hughie Jennings, Joe Kelley, and Kid Gleason which brought championships to the Charm City.

After his career as a big league manager, Hanlon bought a share of the Baltimore Terrapins in the upstart Federal League. After the collapse of the league in 1915 and dissatisfied with the treatment of the Baltimore club in the buy-out of Federal League teams by the American and National Leagues, the Terrapins brought a lawsuit against Major League Baseball challenging its anti-trust exemption. A significant judgment obtained by the Baltimore club in the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia was overturned on appeal and later affirmed by the U.S. Supreme Court in a decision authored by Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr. who ruled that baseball could not be considered interstate commerce and be regulated by the feds. The decision stands today. Hanlon's involvement in the case is blamed for preventing what should have been an automatic induction into the HOF. Remarkably, Hanlon was not enshrined in Cooperstown until 1996.

Originally from Connecticut, Hanlon settled in Baltimore and served on the Baltimore City Board of Park Commissioners for 21 years, which included a term as Board Chairman. Hanlon's son tragically died in combat on the Western Front in France during World War I and Hanlon Park in West Baltimore is named for him. Hanlon died in Baltimore on April 14, 1937.

# Play by the Rules Quiz

- 1) True or false? "Tie goes to the runner."
- 2) Harry jumps out of the way of an inside pitch, but the ball crunches his fingers holding the bat. What is the call?
- 3) Tommy the Pilot hits a slow roller to short with Eddie on third with two out. The shortstop throws wildly in a rush sending the ball past the first baseman. Tommy,

crossing first and running into foul territory, sees the ball get away and so steps toward second before noticing the right fielder backing up the play. Without crossing into fair territory, he jogs toward first. However, the right fielder tosses the ball to the first baseman who tags Tommy. Is Tommy out? Does Eddie (running on contact) score?

- 4) Strangely, at that same moment Henry, Tommy's wise older brother, playing for the Ravens in a game against the Cavaliers, finds himself trying to beat out his own slow roller with two out in the bottom of the last inning. He beats the throw to first, but fails to actually touch first as he charges by. The umpire calls him safe, and he circles back to the base. Play continues and Henry scores when the next batter Marshall slams a game winning home run. What *should* have happened?
- 5) The Cubs are playing the Rams in the playoff final, trailing 3-2. Cub Ben is on third, Katrina on first, and Landon at the plate with one out when the Cub's coach calls for a suicide squeeze. (Ben is running on the pitch.) Landon pops the bunt high to the Ram's pitcher. Because of the squeeze, Ben quickly reaches home. However the pitcher seeing Katrina off her base too, tosses the ball leisurely to the first baseman to complete the double play. Both teams leave the field. What is the score, and why?
